

Easter a Season of Change and Transition – The Reverend Bill Bartlett

Every year the arrival of spring and the celebration of Easter remind us of hope in desolation. When the uncertainty that comes with change seems to be the undercurrent of what we do, we can turn to the Easter message for affirmation of our belief that in times of tumult, there is hopefulness.

Friends, we know change will always be with us on the journey of life. For many in our congregation, recent times have brought major personal changes: the death of loved ones, loss of relationships, loss of employment, major health issues, and a change in places of residence. For others, change has come with beginning a new relationship, the birth of a child, graduation from school, leaving home and starting a new career.

As a congregation, we have also been going through change and transitions, similar to all churches throughout the province and country. At St. James we carry on our daily work in the midst of change, as together we move through the process of putting into action the findings of our discernment for new ministry and office personnel.

As I ponder the theme of change and the last days of this Lenten Season, words from the book *The Emerging Church: A Model for Change and a Map for Renewal* (2008), by Bruce Sanguin, come to mind. Bruce writes "I want to help our congregations to be alive—to be centres of authenticity, vitality, and creativity. I want to be with others who drink deeply from the well of living waters and then make a *Christ-shaped offering of all the*

nourishment they've received. In other words, I want to be with those who want to make a difference in the world. There is so much untapped potential in our congregations."

I can only imagine Jesus having a sense of the untapped potential in those who travelled with him and in those who gathered to see him on the journey to Jerusalem. As Easter people, Jesus would also have each one of us live out our full potential in our personal lives and as a congregation. My prayer for all of us, as we hear again the resurrection story, is that we will hold fast to the hope-filled certainty of new beginning places inherent in its message. As a bulb planted in the earth bursts forth into the beauty of an Easter lily, may our places of change and transition be transformed into avenues of new life.

He called the waiter and placed his order saying, "Two cups of coffee, with one of them for the wall." We heard this order with interest and observed that he was served with one cup of coffee, but he paid for two. As soon as he left, the waiter pasted a piece of paper on the wall saying, "A Cup of Coffee."

While we were still there, two other men entered and ordered three cups of coffee, two on the table and one for the wall. They had two cups of coffee but paid for three and left. This time also the waiter did the same. He pasted a piece of paper on the wall saying, "A Cup of Coffee."

It seemed that this gesture was a norm at this place. However, it was something unique and perplexing for us. Since we had nothing to do with the matter, we finished our coffee, paid the bill and left.

After a few days, we again had a chance to go to this coffee shop. While we were enjoying our coffee, a man entered. The way this man was dressed did not match the standard nor the atmosphere of this coffee shop. Poverty was evident from the looks on his face. As he seated himself, he looked at the wall and said, "One cup of coffee from the wall." The waiter served coffee to this man with the customary respect and dignity.

The man had his coffee and left without paying. We were amazed to watch all this when the waiter took off a piece of paper from the wall and threw it in the waste basket. Now the matter was very clear. The great respect for the needy shown by the inhabitants of this town welled up our eyes with tears.

Coffee is not a need of our society, nor a necessity of life. The point to note is that when we take pleasure in any blessing, maybe we also need to think about those people who appreciate that specific blessing as much as we do, but they cannot afford it.

Note the character of this waiter, who is playing a consistent and generous role as he helped the needy with a smile on his face. Also ponder upon this man in need. He enters the coffee shop without having to lower his self-esteem asking for a free cup of coffee. He only needs to look at the wall.

Along with the other characters, we need to remember the role played by the wall that reflects the generosity and care of the dwellers of this town.

GO Project 2013

This summer we will be once more hosting the GO Project at St. James. Our site coordinator is Alana Martin. She will be arriving in St. John's on June 2 to start the process of setting up this summer's project. The other three team members will be arriving on June 23 for two weeks of training before the participants arrive on July 7. We will need billets for Alana and her team so if you can provide a bed and some meals for Alana from June 2-July 18 or one of the three leaders from June 23-July 6, please contact Susan Sheppard.

In other Go news, we have 10 youth and leaders travelling to GO Halifax and 5 staying home to do GO St. John's. If any others are still interested in registering please, contact Susan as soon as possible. GO St. John's is the only Go site that has not required participants to bring air mattress. Until now we have been able to borrow camp cots from the Canadian Military. Unfortunately that option is no longer available to us. We would like to continue providing camp cots and would like to purchase 30 at a cost of approximately \$100 each. These would be used for GO and any other group using St. James for overnight events. They would also be a great asset to the church to have in case of another emergency such as we saw on September 11, 2001. We are hoping that individuals, families or groups may be interested in donating the cost of a camp cot (\$100) in memory of loved ones. Donations should be made out to St. James United Church and labeled for camp cots. The group would like to thank you for your continued support.



PROJECT GRACE by Gillian Sheppard

Music has always been a part of the St. James United Church community. In the past the church has had its own "St James Community Band" and lately has played host to the Eastern Wind Ensemble. In addition, there are multiple choirs for children, men and women and a Praise Band! Since September 2012, however, there has been a different kind of music inhabiting the halls of St. James.

Project Grace started in 2011 as a summer music camp, free to students from St. Andrews Elementary School. The camp happened again in July 2012, a little longer (nearly two weeks) and a little more in-depth. The students took daily lessons on violin and cello, in addition to their classes in KinderMusik, Choir, Movement/Yoga, Instrument demonstrations, crafts and games.

All of the children in the 2012 summer camp performed in the fourth annual "Seasons of Love" benefit concert on stage at the D.F. Cook Concert Hall at the MUN School of Music. Their performance received a standing ovation.

In September 2012, Project Grace took on a whole new challenge, loosely following the model of Venezuela's "El Sistema." Project Grace now offers free weekly music lessons in Violin, Cello, Flute and Trumpet to approximately 30 children from all walks of life, regardless of race, gender, age or circumstance.

Project Grace has a faculty of 8 teaching artists and 3 administrative volunteers. The faculty is comprised of current MUN students, local professional musicians, and even one professor from the School of Music. Four of our six string faculty make up the MUN Suncor String Quartet, who donate their time as part of the quartet's outreach mandate.

Faculty and students of Project Grace are now excitedly preparing for their end of semester performances. Students will perform in the Palm Sunday Church Service at 11 am as well as presenting our Winter Semester Showcase at 3:30 pm in the Sanctuary on Sunday, March 24. All are invited to attend. Admission is free; however donations to the program are greatly appreciated.

The camaraderie that has developed between the children, and the skills they have learned – both for playing music and working together as a team in and out of the program – are immediately apparent. For many of these students, without the free tuition and loan of instruments provided by Project Grace, community music making would not be possible. Project Grace is grateful to all those who have supported the program. Any donation, whether it is an instrument, volunteer time, or a financial contribution, is always greatly appreciated.

- 1. **Prepare a Will.** Without one, you lose control over your property at death.

- 5. Make a gift to the Church and receive a lifetime income through a United Church Gift Annuity or Charitable **Remainder Trust.**
- 6. Name the Church as a beneficiary of your **RRSP** or **RRIF.** It will go directly to the Church and not through probate.
- 7. Name the Church as the owner and/or beneficiary of a new, existing or paid-up life insurance policy.
- 8. Ask your financial or estate planning advisor to include charitable giving as part of their counsel to you and their other clients.
- 9. Encourage your Board or Council to establish a Planned Giving Program in your congregation. Your Financial Development Officer can help.
- 10. Contact Clyde Flight, your Financial Development Officer, for more information about how you can leave a legacy to the area(s) of the Church you want to support—your own United Church congregation, Mission and Service of The United Church of Canada, the Peace Fund, a theological college, children's camp, an outreach ministry ... the opportunities are abundant!
