#### **SEASON'S GREETINGS** from the Rev. Terrie Burry

I remember some years ago while I was on Christmas break from theology school, I spent an evening at my grandparents' house in Norman's Cove. In an attempt to multi-task, I brought all my yet-to-be-wrapped presents to their place to deal with while I visited with Nan and Pop, catching up with them after a semester in Halifax.

An hour later, the living room floor looked like the devastating aftermath of an explosion in Santa's workshop and, while sporadically wincing in pain from my self-inflicted wrapping paper cuts, I told my grandfather about my Hebrew course that had nearly caused me a nervous collapse. "Seriously, Pop," I said, removing tape from my chin and lining a crease in the wrapping paper, "I nearly lost my marbles over this course. I had to translate Psalm 23 from the original Hebrew into English — and let's be clear, it's not a direct word-for-word translation — and then write a paper about it! It took a week of my life I will never get back. I did, however, learn something that was really interesting and kind of nice."

"And what's that now, me duckie babes?" asked Pop, the one person who could sit and listen forever when I talked theological jargon; he always appeared to be genuinely interested.

"When we were talking about the Psalm and references to shepherds in the Bible, our professor told us about the sheep she had growing up. She liked the passage about Jesus (as the shepherd) saying His sheep knew His voice, because that's how it works with shepherds and their sheep. The sheep will only follow their shepherd and respond to their shepherd's voice. Isn't that really nice?"

Pop begged to differ, passionately. "Mind, now, my duckie babes! Sheep?! Just listen to 'da shepherd?! Sheep are 'da most ignorant creatures ever I saw. Any fool who come along wit' a big enough piece a cabbage, the sheep would go on with him!" He then began a very dignified and reverent rendition of "While shepherds wash their socks by night all seated 'round the tub, and a bottle of sunlight soap came down and they began to scrub...."

I didn't know it at the time, but this would be my last Christmas with my grandfather. And yet, five years later, every time I sit with the ribbons, paper and tape to wrap presents for my loved ones, I remember this night--the smell of his Christmas tree, the warmth of the room, the glow of the lights, the sound of Pop singing about dirty-footed shepherds, knowing I was surrounded by love.

I find there is something about this season of cold, lights, darkness, love and mystery that has a way of causing the past, present and future to flow together in a way I don't experience other times of the year. Maybe you feel the same way. Family traditions, baking, certain smells, take us back to memories of the past. The busyness of the season, all the tasks and errands to be completed, these keep our heads focused on the "right now." The changes that come with the ebb and flow of time--new relationships, the loss of old friends, changing of patterns to accommodate new circumstances--all these things can make us weary or hopeful of an unknown future. In this space, our past, present and future freely mingle, and in these Advent and Christmas seasons, the presence of the Christ Child is found giving testimony of God's plan for the ages.

Friends, may you have a blessed Advent. May you experience the mystery and wonder of the One who comes to us with the royal majesty proclaimed by the stars and angels, the heavenly hosts.

May you find companionship with the One who, in the most humbling of circumstances, took on flesh and bone in the vulnerability of a baby's body that He might later walk among us and show us

the way home.

From my family to yours, have a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year.


Each December then, we enter into a season of waiting, longing and expecting. God's spirit meets us in the centre of all that may be wrong in our lives.

## YOUTH AND CHRISTIAN EDUCATION PROGRAMS By Susan Sheppard

We now have three youth groups! The original youth group has grown up and moved in two directions. First, three founders of our youth group have taken on leadership of a Junior High group which meets twice a month. The rest of the group, plus the junior group leaders, have also just begun their own Young Adults group which plans to meet monthly and include their significant others. Ideas for activities and service work were discussed at their first meeting on Monday, October 27. The third group is our original High School youth group led by Rebecca Pike. They have many exciting things planned for the next few months. Junior and Senior High School groups met together for a Halloween Party on Thursday, October 30, while all three groups are planning a party to decorate the church for Advent and Christmas on November 29. They will be organizing and running a Christmas Party for the younger Youth Groups to be held later in December. Our movie night on Friday, December 5, featured "The Nativity Story" and was attended by 7.

**Sunday School.** The Godly Play materials were moved into their new home on movable shelving units in the Youth Centre. We have 6-10 three to eight-year olds exploring Bible stories in there each week. The nine to twelve-year olds (7-9 children each week) are meeting in the Multi-purpose room with their new curriculum 'Connect' using video presentations, reading, making related crafts and discussing the lesson. Both teachers and children are very enthusiastic about this program. There are several youth helping out with the nursery, and those who are not occupied as helpers (grades 9+) have asked for a program of their own, so we started 'Echo the Story' with them in November. The Sunday School is also working on a drama for the White Gift service being held on December 14.

**Confirmation.** We have had two confirmation classes so far this year with 9 youth attending. At our October 26 class, the topic was "what do we believe about God?" On December 6, the discussion was "what do we believe about the Bible?" and in preparation, they were invited to attend our movie night.

Dancing. We now have two Liturgical Dance groups. The older girls have a new choreographer for their group and are working on a new worship dance. We had a delightful problem and solution in that several younger girls wanted to join the dancers, but due to the limited space on the chancel, adding to the group would be both impractical and unsafe. So, two of the older girls are working with the younger ones as a separate dance group. Our original group presented their first offering on November 16. It was a beautiful piece danced to the very moving song 'Say Something.' Both dance groups will dance during the White Gift Service. Our six-week session of Sacred Circle Dance has finished; though not well attended, it was enjoyed by those who did come.

The Go Project team led the worship with Sight Restored providing the music on October 19. The participants were all super engaged in Dave Csinos' second talk on building 'church' using Lego as the metaphor. The theme for the closing worship changed midway through from 'sharing light' to the Book of Job because they all wanted to know what this story Rebecca had been referring to all weekend was about. Out came the Godly Play story!

When that was finished, someone said Satan can't really be in the Bible, so Rebecca read them the first couple of verses. Now they want to study this story in youth group!



There will be two Go projects in St. John's this summer, the first from July 5-16 and the other from July 26-August 6. There would be an extra \$500 cost to the host congregation, bringing the total we would pay to Go to \$8000. On the other hand, if we get another congregation to host the second program, we would share the cost 50/50 so our cost would decrease to \$4000. They are also looking at hiring staff more locally which could mean summer employment for some of our Go Project alumni.

Youth Retreat. The Conference Youth Forum scheduled for Loon Bay Camp on October 17-19 was cancelled due to low (no) registration. Rebecca and I took on the task of reorganizing the event, in just over two weeks, for the St. John's area because we had a non-refundable

#### FINDING THE MISSING PEACE - SuAn Randall, Office Administrator

The English proverb, 'Necessity is the mother of invention' could well be turned on its head these days to say 'Invention is the mother of necessity.' Before my cell phone and laptop existed, I managed quite well, or so I thought. Yet now that these technologies are ubiquitous, they have become essential components of my daily life. Don't get me wrong; I treasure inventions that can aid my lifestyle. However, there remains one precious commodity that cannot be produced in any factory, nor will ever roll off any assembly line, and that is, quite simply, peace.

Songs have been written about it, pilgrimages made to various locations and ironically, wars waged, all in the pursuit of peace. One of the greatest messages of this Christmas season is 'Peace on earth; goodwill to all.' The fact that we repeat this wish year after year indicates that it still eludes us. Perhaps the most time-tested and true habit to come to know ourselves as peace is to just close our eyes, take a few minutes (3-7), allow our stomach to move gently and deeply up and down in rhythm with our breath, and then redirect our thinking to know that whatever we see or do not see with closed eyes is just perfect. During this time, the infinitely vast, peaceful space that is forever within us and around us, whether we perceive it as something or nothing, is instantly accessible.

This last strategy can be done anywhere, anytime, except when driving of course. At this time of celebration, I wish peace on earth; goodwill to all.

#### AN INVITATION TO THE CHRISTMAS EVE SERVICE by Marilyn Adams

This year only one service is scheduled for Christmas Eve – approved by the Worship and Sacraments Committee.

The recommendation for this change came from the Worship Team (formerly Music and Liturgy Committee) following lengthy discussions regarding the format and attendance at both Christmas Eve services in the past few years. Much consideration was given to the diverse needs of our congregation and a commitment to providing a meaningful experience on the Eve of Christ's Birth including the celebration of Communion. As examples, our seniors who are unable, for various reasons, to attend the later service for Communion and/or do not find the Family Service inspiring; families with young children who need to be settled at a reasonable hour thus exempting them from partaking in communion; persons who must travel on Christmas Eve to be with their loved ones but who also want to connect with their church family; and the unpredictable weather at this time of year (safety being a concern). The recommendation for one service formatted to meet the needs of our congregation evolved from this discussion.

The service this year has been planned to encourage and enable all members/families to rejoice together on this most Holy Eve. Recognizing the time constraints for some of those who are working, the exuberance of young children, young families with infants, our youth, the middle aged, and older members who perhaps can no longer tolerate the noise and activity of the traditional family service, we are presenting a new arrangement.

The service has two components: a traditional Family celebration and a Communion celebration. The Family component will begin at 7 p.m. and transition into the Communion Service at approximately 8 p.m., concluding at 8:30 p.m.

The service has been designed to enable families to join the service or conversely exit the service during the singing of any carol. You can come and stay for the entire 90 minutes, participate in the Family portion of the service, join partway through the service or, leave, as your circumstance dictates. Ushers will be able and willing to provide assistance and direction during the service.

At approximately 8 p.m., the transition for Communion will occur with the playing/singing of several Christmas carols. The ushers will be directed to close the sanctuary doors at a given time to allow for personal spiritual reflection in preparation for the celebration of Communion.

We realise this will be a learning experience for all of us, and we ask your patience through this endeavour. We are not discouraging the meeting and greeting of friends and family as we gather and/or depart – both vestibules will be available along with the Fellowship Room for extended conversations. We encourage you to continue to share season's greetings with your church family.

The Worship and Sacraments Committee, through the Worship Team, will conduct an evaluation of the success of this new format in the New Year. Your feedback will be essential to this process.

We invite all who are able to come and join in the true celebration of Christmas. To those who cannot, we wish you a most holy and blessed Christmas season; we will include you in our prayers.

#### **Financing Major Projects**

Two major renovations projects commenced on the St James church property in the summer of 2012 with completion in the fall of the same year and consisted of new roof shingles for the church and extension plus all new windows and doors for the Hillcrest Daycare (10 Paton Street).


The loan with the Bank of Nova Scotia to carry out a portion of the noted work commenced September 2012 with an opening balance of \$75,000 and has been proceeding very well from the income proceeds from the Hillcrest Daycare rental. The balance of the loan to date is \$43,750.

Your Property Committee and Church Council have an initiative to try and pay the loan off a little earlier than planned to enable St James to use the daycare rental income to offset other rising operating and maintenance costs and save on the loan interest payments.

#### **Comprehensive Review Task Group Shares Broad Directions**

The <u>Comprehensive Review Task Group</u> first gathered two years ago "to examine the comprehensive vision and circumstances of The United Church of Canada and develop a report and recommendations for the 42nd General Council 2015 that will best enable the church to live faithfully in God's world at this time in the church's life." We were told everything was on the table, but little did we know just how large the table would turn out to be. We are pleased today to share the broad directions we plan to put forward in our final report, which we expect will be available in the first part of 2015.

While the impetus for the Comprehensive Review was both financial and structural, the main purpose is to enable the church to participate more energetically and faithfully in God's new creation. The United Church has been living beyond its means, and as givings continue to decline we need to reduce spending above the congregational level by \$10 million. As our membership shrinks, the church also no longer has the volunteers it needs to run its existing structures and effectively engage in ministry and mission in our current context. But in our broad consultations across the church, research, and analysis, it also became clear that structural change, while a necessary step toward sustainability, is just part of what is needed to revitalize the church. Revitalization will also depend on spiritual renewal and investing energy and resources in innovative and reinvigorated ministries that authentically engage people in their faith journeys. The task group believes a sustainable structure is a key step toward the spiritual renewal the church has been yearning for.

Throughout the past two years, the task group has been committed to listening to the wisdom of the church and communicating regularly about its work. That's why last year we asked communities of faith—more than 600 in all—to share their hopes, dreams, and frustrations with us. It's also why we shared two discussion papers, Fishing on the Other Side and Trust God; Trust the Body, which contained preliminary structural concepts we were working with, as well as the wisdom we gathered from presbyteries and Conference meetings about these concepts. While this and other feedback confirmed some of our preliminary concepts, it also prompted us over the past few months to shift our thinking significantly on others. We shared our new working model with the Executive of the General Council at its meeting on Nov. 15-17, 2014, and are grateful for the faithful and honest engagement of that body, which has helped us further clarify and improve our thinking.

What haven't changed are the principles we believe must guide any structural change. We believe local communities of faith need to be at the core of the United Church, with resources and energy focused on supporting their vitality. We believe that being united strengthens our faithful response. We believe governance and administrative structures should be simplified so people and resources can be focused on ministry and mission. We believe we should live within our means and our funding mechanisms should be transparent. We believe oversight and discipline functions should be separated from collegial support. We also believe we must continue to live into our commitment to right relations between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal peoples.

#### Comprehensive Review Task Group Shares Broad Directions (cont'd)

As we begin to write our final report, we feel it is important to share with the church the broad directions we are planning to recommend. They include:

- A faith project with significant resources to renew current ministry, enable new forms of ministry, enliven and equip our leadership, and lift up and celebrate our successful ministries.
- A continuing process for Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people in the church to co-create structures and processes that work for justice and right relations between us, at a pace that is appropriate and respectful.
- A structure made up of three councils, instead of the current four courts:
  - Vibrant and diverse communities of faith that would take a variety of forms.
  - Regional councils that would support the work of communities of faith.
  - A denominational council with representatives from each community of faith that would elect a Moderator and vote on denomination-shaping issues.

A significantly smaller denominational executive to reflect the principle that all voices of our diverse church must be heard but not necessarily always be present.

- A College of Ministers that would uphold denominational standards for ministers and deal with cases of discipline.
- Strong encouragement for ministers to explore whether to set up an association or networks for collegiality and peer support.
- · Clusters of neighbouring communities of faith that would come together to explore ministry, and networks that would continue to connect those with like interests.
- Changes that would mean ministry and mission would be funded from donations to the Mission and Service Fund, and support structures through an assessment of communities of faith.

We know you will have questions, but we ask for your patience. We expect to share our final report, along with accompanying material to help you explore the recommendations, by March 2015. More information on how to direct your responses to the final report will be available later from the planning committee for the 42nd General Council. The Council will meet in August 2015 in Corner Brook, Newfoundland, to consider our recommendations.

The members of the task group thank you. We have worked hard to be transparent and build trust. And you have joined in the process with enthusiasm, patience, and hope. We hope that sharing our work in progress will contribute to this faithful and hopeful conversation.


