EASTER GREETINGS FROM AOTS

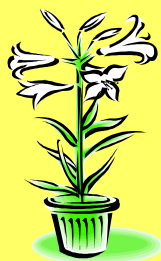
GO PROJECT, PROJECT GRACE, BRIDGES TO HOPE

Easter Reflection by Michael Ralph

During the dark days of Lent, we reflect on the Cross, the tomb and the resurrection. My thoughts turn to the *Via Dolorosa*, the way of sorrows, the walk which marks Christ's final days in Jerusalem.

Twenty-six years ago as an undergraduate, I had the opportunity to spend a month in Israel to see the sharp contrasts it embodies – an ultramodern Western nation, a nation trapped in antiquity, a powder keg, the custodian of the world's holy places. At that time, it was the height of the first intifada, or uprising, and there were places we could go and others it was wise not to. Staying at a turn-of-the-century Church of England hostel with Arab Christian tour guides also opened doors and minds.

And in the middle of that pain and uncertainty runs the *Via Dolorosa*, through the walled old city of Jerusalem from the *Ecce Homo*, the arch where Pilate says, "*Behold the Man*", to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre on the site of Calvary. They mark the 14 Stations of the Cross as Christ goes from trial to crucifixion.

The walk occurs each Friday, led by the Franciscans, and takes several hours as there is a stop at each station, a short prayer in English, Latin and several other languages, and the whole group moves again through the streets. It dates back to the 14th century. The contrast in participants is striking. Curiosity seekers, faith pilgrims, interested academics and casual tourists all come along. On the fringes, Israeli police or soldiers with an Uzi or M-16 and a teargas grenade launcher ensure the walk proceeds without incident.

There is no hiding from the world, and the world does not stop. There is unkindness and anger intermingled with moments of incredible reverence and awe. Wrapping your mind around the location where Simon the Cyrene is forced to carry the Cross for Christ, while the Fifth Station Souvenir T-Shirt Shop on the other side of the narrow alleyway does a roaring business, is not easy.

And maybe that's where we are as Christians at Easter. We mark the days from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday. We contemplate Good Friday. We have special services to remind us that faith matters; and, if we are lucky, we find others to share this outlook. But what we can't do is either hide from the world or absent ourselves from it. We have no choice but to be in it, but not necessarily to be of it.

The procession moves slowly through crowded streets and disinterested onlookers. The people in the procession are from diverse backgrounds and stages in their faith journey. Some will do it many times; for others it is a once-in-a-lifetime event. The procession has occurred for hundreds of years and will continue to occur long after our part has been run.

Walking the *Via Dolorosa* is a physical manifestation of our faith journey. We remember our past, consider our present, and that helps guide us to our future. It is a universal journey; and in the heat and the dirt and the smell of a congested Middle Eastern city, a very human one.

The Way of Sorrows is part of our past, our present, and perhaps our destiny as well. It is our cup and we have to choose to take it, with its cost and benefits, or not. We cannot ignore it.
