Minute for Mission: Our gifts for Mission & Service support community ministries to hold space for those who otherwise would be lost and unknown. A simple candle is lit in the chapel at First United Church in the Downtown Eastside of Vancouver. The gathering on unceded Coast Salish traditional territory is acknowledged. We honour a community member who has died from drug poisoning. People in our neighborhood have come for many reasons. In spite of living on or below poverty incomes, in inadequate housing or rough on the street, they have made this community their home. In a relatively small footprint of land, people know and care deeply for one another. Today the church opens its doors to hold space for affirming life. Across Canada, more than 12,800 opioid-related deaths occurred between January 2016 and March 2019. 82 percent of accidental opioid-related deaths involved fentanyl or fentanyl analogues. Likely every church and community has been affected by drug poisoning. Vancouver's inner city has been profoundly shaken by this pandemic. Public education, access to harm reduction supplies and safe consumption sites have begun to slowly reduce the numbers. We advocate for change in drug policy, increased housing, easier access to treatment facilities, and more supports for those who struggle with mental illness. Your support for Mission & Service allows First United and other community ministries to continue a ministry of seeking justice and holding space for life.
