Important logistical notes!...

The hump by the doors will serve as the outdoor stage. People standing on, or in front of, the "stage" to sing, must stand 2 m apart. Parked cars ("bubbles") will face it and the church.

Drivers, for smooth controlled, traffic flow, please arrive and enter from Elizabeth Avenue only by 7:15 pm to be ushered to a designated, physically distanced, parking spot in lines, like lining up for the gulf ferry, and in a checkerboard pattern, to ensure you are 2 m from other cars, safe in your "bubbles" with the windows down. Exit onto Paton Street only at the end.

To ensure visibility, ushers will try to designate the spots in front for smaller cars, while SUVs and pick-up trucks will be designated to park behind them.

Humanitarian Aid for Rohingya

No person should ever be persecuted because of their religion or culture.; have to struggle daily to find enough food, a place to sleep, or simply a place to exist, yet that has happened repeatedly to the Rohingya Muslims in Myanmar. For decades they faced religious and ethnic persecution, which escalated in 2017. They were tortured and killed in Myanmar, and their homes and villages were burned to the ground.

Almost a million escaped to the town of Cox's Bazar in nearby Bangladesh to what became, in November 2018, the largest refugee camp in the world.

ACT Alliance, a Mission & Service global ecumenical partner, is on the ground at the Cox's Bazar refugee camp distributing humanitarian aid in the form of food, shelter materials, warm clothing, hygiene kits, safe water, and emergency medical help. ACT Alliance also hosted the organization Clowns Without Borders to share the importance of hygiene in a fun way. The Cox's Bazar camp is located in a floodplain; mix that with almost a million people and the result can be a variety of diseases, some of them life-threatening. Thanks to ACT Alliance, many of the Rohingya refugees are able to keep disease at bay by using the skills they were taught and the hygiene kits they received. Through our gifts for Mission & Service, lives are truly saved every day in Cox's Bazar camp.
