Q What does Jesus notice?

Q What "important" events do we give our attention to and in doing so, what do we miss?

Q What are the empty ceremonies and the contrasting real actions going on in our communities of faith?

You will need:
black and red tissue paper
pencil
scissors
pipe cleaners
circle shapes to trace 2" and 5" diameter (5cm and 12.513cm)
optional - large needle
