Sometimes, growth is so slow that it can feel like nothing will ever change.


- What is it like for you to hope for growth that you may not see?

Things to Make and Do

Advent Wreath

God is with us in the Advent waiting time. A wreath can remind us that God loves and cares for us always.

You need green construction paper; orange, and yellow tissue paper squares, 1 paper plate; 4 paper tubes; paint, markers or crayons; glue; scissors



Instructions

- 1. Have a grownup cut 4 holes in the paper plate the size of the paper tubes.
- 2. If you wish paint your paper tubes. Advent candles are usually 3 blue and 1 white.
- 3. Make at least 12 handprints from the green construction paper. (Tip: stack two or three sheets of paper together and cut through all thicknesses).
- 4. Turn the paper plate over and glue paper hand shapes around the outer rim of the plate.
- 5. Insert four paper tubes into the prepared holes.
- 6. Twist several squares of orange, and yellow tissue paper together to create four flames and gently insert each "flame" down inside each paper tube "candle."
- 7. Each week, gently pull up the tissue paper flames to "light" the required number of candles. (Advent 3 is the pink one)
