Ministry Message

REV. JAMES RAVENSCROFT

Here we are, well into Lent and looking toward both the celebrations of Holy Week and the Season of Easter. These past weeks of Lent we have been marking "40 Days of Contemplation and Action". In this time, we have engaged in spiritual practices as part of the Sunday service and had the opportunity to explore it more fully as part of our Wednesday brown-bag lunch and communion celebrations. Folks have had a chance to walk the labyrinth, pray reflectively with scripture, practice centering prayer and more, all to give people a chance to find a practice they can adopt and grow spiritually. But this is just the contemplation part. We have also been able to live out that spiritual growth by using the calendar put together by our Social and Eco Action Committee, not just looking at impacts of our lifestyle choices but seeking change in the world by supporting organizations funded by the Mission and Service Fund.

Joining contemplation and action together is not just about Lent, but about Holy Week and Easter as well. Consider the moments in Jesus' life that we will reflect upon in the joint services led by United Church leaders in Metro St. John's. We recall how Jesus cleansed the Temple, Mary anointed Jesus' feet, Jesus gathered with his friends to celebrate the Passover and washed their feet, inviting us to do the same, all leading to his death on the cross and the resurrection. We prayerfully recall each of these in turn, culminating in the celebration of the Easter Vigil service on Holy Saturday, one of the church's most profound and ancient liturgies.

In all of the services of Holy Week, we celebrate quite active accounts and yet prayer is part of each of them. Jesus finds the capacity to do what he did through his being immersed in his relationship with God. We see this most profoundly in the transition between Maundy Thursday and Good Friday, as he prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, seeking the courage to face what was coming next.

The stories we hear throughout the Easter Season show us the same pattern. The women go to the tomb to prayerfully anoint Jesus' body and angels tell them that Jesus has been raised from the dead. Two disciples are leaving Jerusalem for fear of the authorities and the stranger who walked with them is revealed to be Jesus as they break bread (code for communion). Again and again Jesus appears to them as they pray, and he continues to work through them as the apostles share the good news with others and communities are formed where they share what they own in common and look after those among them in most need. Prayer and action going hand in hand as the Christian community grows not just in the number of people but the people themselves grow in their relationship with God in Christ.

That pattern is the foundation for any one of us who seeks to follow Christ in our lives. But it takes time and dedication as we turn to God in prayer and drawn on the wisdom, insight and strength we discover in that relationship to discern how we can be of service in our community and world. I am thankful then that we have these seasons to go deeper, not just each Lent but in the fifty days of the Easter Season, leading us from the empty tomb of Easter Sunday to the apostles empowered by the Holy Spirit on Pentecost to continue on where Jesus left off, immersing themselves in prayer and responding with action in the world. May these remaining days of Lent and the coming weeks of Easter be a time of continued growth in prayer, of sustained actions for change in the world, of dedication to the two-fold way of following Christ, the one who both suffered on the cross and is present with us, risen in God's love and grace.

The root system of a plant is where essential nutrients are absorbed and distributed to the rest of the plant. Roots provide stability, nourishment, and longevity to the plant. We must be strategic in the way we fertilize our spiritual roots in order to promote steady growth and reap a bountiful harvest. Slow and steady growth is the key to establishing a deeper faith. It's so tempting to try to rush the process by any means necessary, but we must never allow our desire to produce a harvest to overshadow our need to protect and nourish our roots.

We all struggle to thrive where we are planted.

Get to know your needs with your faith journey. When you plant too close together, some plants don't get enough light or water and eventually get choked out. If you've been with the same church group and you don't feel your faith growing maybe it's time to re-plant. Join another committee within the church, or take a break to recharge, or even search out other congregations. You know what's best for you. Soon, though, you'll find a faith group which gives you enough space to grow and thrive.

Growing deep roots takes time and a solid strategy.

The beautiful thing about gardening is many, many smart people have journeyed the path before you and willingly share their knowledge with novices. The same rings true for our faith walk. If you want to grow a deeper faith, find a Christian mentor to teach you all they know about creating the best conditions for sustaining spiritual root systems. Reach out and ask questions. There's always someone willing to help you explore your faith journey. Roots grow in all directions, searching for nutrients, so don't let one voice be the only source of your faith. Cultivate relationships with many people, with differing opinions to feel your faith journey grow.

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It's impossible to garden without getting dirty.

Every good gardener knows roots need oxygen to stay healthy and do their job of gathering water and nutrients for the plant. In the same way, we need to be willing to faithfully till the compact soil in our own lives. We must work to soften the places where we are impenetrable, impermeable, and hardened by the people who have walked all over us in the past. In order to grow a deeper faith, we must pray often, to reveal our "hard spots" and give us strength to walk in forgiveness and grace.

Pruning is a painful, yet necessary process for healthy plant growth. We must accept the fact that we can have it all, but we can't have it all at once. In order to grow a deep faith, we must learn how to set aside the good things in order to grab a hold of the best things. We must cut back in order to increase. We must say no in order to say yes. That may mean saying no to joining another committee, or providing for the next potluck.

Just like gardening, life is full of unexpected challenges. In order to succeed at either, we need to be willing and able to adjust our course of action and expectations when circumstances change. If you're open to change, your faith journey may surprise you.

St. James Income Snapshot

Below is the January Income Statement for the last four years. 2019 was a year that we were in full swing with programs and groups up and running with a full staff. In 2020 we had the biggest snow fall we had in years and were closed for a couple of Sundays. COVID-19 started mid March and Rev. Brian retired at the end of June requiring pulpit supply fill in on Sundays. In 2021 we were almost a full year with COVID-19 and people not attending church, all programs stopped. Our Sunday services were under the care of pulpit supply for seven months when Rev. James arrived. In 2022, we were in lock down due to COVID-19 while the church was closed for January. You will notice the decline in revenue over the past three years mainly due to restrictions and people not attending church. Our church expenses have remained consistent and in 2021 we had a decrease in salaries. Our challenge for 2022 will be to increase our revenue so that we will not have a deficit at year end. More on the budget at our annual meeting on Sunday, March 27th.

COOKWITHKIDS

RESURRECTION ROLLS

A great Easter recipe to do with the kids! Rolls with marshmallows wrapped inside, which become hollow as they bake, it represents the tomb of Jesus on Easter morning, when you break them open they are empty inside!

Ingredients

1 (10 ounce) can refrigerated crescent dinner rolls
8 large marshmallows
¼ cup melted butter
2 tablespoons ground cinnamon
2 tablespoons white sugar

Directions

Step 1 Preheat oven to 400 degrees F (200 degrees C). Lightly grease a baking sheet.

Step 2 Separate crescent rolls into individual triangles.

Step 3 In a small bowl, mix together cinnamon and sugar.

Step 4 Dip a marshmallow into melted butter, then roll in sugar mixture. Place marshmallow into the center of a dough triangle. Carefully wrap the dough around the marshmallow. Pinch the seams together tightly to seal in marshmallow as it melts. Place on a baking sheet. Repeat.

Step 5 Bake in a preheated oven until golden brown, about 15 minutes.
