#### TREASURER'S MESSAGE

Financial Update – Below is a financial update to where we are at the end of March 2023 versus where we should be Budget wise.

As you can see, at the end of March we have a net loss (deficit) of \$44,183.

Back at the Annual General Meeting in March the congregation did vote to accept a deficit budget of \$11,510. We as a congregation have lots of work to do over the next seven months to try and reach or come close to our budget.

- 1. The reason the revenue is down is a slight decline in the envelope givings and less fundraising.
- 2. Our heat is up and that is due to the cost of oil. The cost has fluctuated a lot since the budget was approved by council back in December.
- 3. The insurance cost rose by about 8% over last year.

The Finance Committee will give you updates each month to let you know where we are financially.



#### QUADRANGLE NL

June is pride month. St. James has been an affirming congregation for a few years now and has had some new occupants in one of our rooms in the last few months.

Recently I sat down with Charlie Murphy, Executive Director of Quadrangle NL, to discuss their organization and how they came to be part of St. James United Church.

Thank you Charlie for meeting with me and first I want to ask what exactly is Quadrangle?

We are hoping to be a physical space welcoming to all members of the 2SLGBTQIA+ community in Newfoundland and Labrador, which will house and offer services and programs designed to create social connections, provide resources, and advance all aspects of health and the quality of life for our community through inclusion and diversity, community development, collaboration, and recognition. Quadrangle is just in Newfoundland and Labrador but there are other similar organizations across the country. We are the only solely mandated 2SLGBTQIA+ charity of the province.

Why come to St. James United Church?

I've done work with the St. John's chapter of PFLAG and they were always being invited to the diversity fairs here at St. James. Eventually Quad was invited to the fair. It's always been positive and nice. Rev. James asked where we were located and I mentioned we were looking for a space. It's been interesting to tell people that we're in a church space. Will they be upset or uncomfortable knowing the office is located in a church? So far, it's been great! Everyone who we've had in the space for our special events before the opening have felt very welcomed and safe.

Seeing how so many other organizations work out of this space acts more like a community hub which is what Quad is hoping to be.

Do you think attitudes have changed towards gay people within the church?

The concept of religion is more of a challenge than being here in St. James. The history of the church and its treatment of 2SLGBTQIA+ will be a challenge. It's a journey we will have to go on. It also helps the church in having a conversation about gender and sexuality. This church and the United Church, in general, has made the intention of having a conversation about the harm the church has done in the past. Quad needs to be part of that discussion. Us being in this space is helping with the healing process.

How can St. James support Quadrangle?

That's an interesting one. Talk to your MHA about us, donate, and ask the questions. Questions that are more relevant to the community as a whole, not the individual. Find ways to participate in something Quadrangle is doing. Come to a dinner, or bingo night, or dance. Knock on our door and introduce yourself.

Where do you see Quadrangle in the future?

We'd love to have our own dedicated building on a piece of land with a lot of green space. We could have a coffee shop, a bookstore, and even a medical clinic, counselling, meeting rooms, offices, archives, and more. Creating a community hub for small businesses that could be incubated and grow for the queer community. We are currently trying to do research, service provision, programs, space, as well as getting a building. This should have existed 30 years ago. The community has been talking about this space for this long. Having a physical space where you can just feel comfortable being yourself would help a lot.

## **Pastoral Care**

Traditionally pastoral/spiritual care, in the context of our church, is perceived as one of the duties of ministry personnel. As compassionate care is part of human nature, the capacity for passionate care in the form of a listening ear, words of acknowledgement, and acts of kindness – small actions such as sending cards and notes that say "...thinking of you..." or a birthday greeting; over time that view has expanded to include supportive, pastoral presence by ministry personnel as well as lay members of the congregation.

How many of you have experienced such caring during times of loss like the loss of a loved one – the losses experienced during that change and grief of moving of one way of living to another? How many have experienced the support of a co-worker or friend upon the loss of a job, a time of moving from one town to another, the loss of a friend due to differences that cannot be mended? All such instances show us the value in and make apparent the ways we do pastoral care together.

When a committee of lay persons and ministry personnel is formed such as we have here at St James United pastoral care becomes a collaborative effort amongst congregants, the pastoral care team, and ministry personnel – we all have a role to play – one very important part of the pastoral care role is communication. Unlike the olden days personal information regarding a person's health is no longer made available to pastoral care providers (ministry personnel or lay) by our health authorities. Thus, if you or a loved one would like a visit while in hospital it is a good practice to let your pastoral care provider know so a visit can be arranged...

All of this does not negate the special pastoral relationship between ministry personnel and congregants – there are timeswhen persons desire the presence of their minister and feel more comfortable sharing what is on their heart in that shared relationship.

We, your pastoral care committee invite you to take part in the pastoral health of our congregation.

## Celebrating Diversity

Since 1990, July has been recognized as Disability Pride Month. While this has mostly been happening in the United States, the concept is starting to catch hold elsewhere. As a disabled man, I'd like to take a moment to reflect on the reasoning behind this.

On July 26, 1990 the Government of the USA passed the ADA – the Americans with Disabilities Act. This was a milestone in that such legislation didn't exist anywhere. In Canada, many provinces have followed suit, led by Ontario. Last year, our provincial government passed enabling legislation to enshrine accessibility into all aspects of decision making.

But what is disability pride? The group AmeriDisability defines it as "accepting and honouring each person's uniqueness and seeing it as a natural and beautiful part of human diversity". Notice there is no reference to deficiency. No talk of what someone can't do. Disability is a natural and beautiful part of our human experience. Disabled people are proudly disabled. I know I am, and I wouldn't change anything about myself if I was magically given the opportunity. It gives me a special lens to view the world, and through articles like this to share that lens with you.

As Christians, we need to be open to the idea of a disability theology. There are parts of scripture that are very hurtful to the disabled. Disability is seen as sinful, to be pitied, or something to be healed. Instead, it needs celebration and understanding. It's complex.

I came to St. James because it welcomes diversity. Beginning in July, a disability pride flag will join the other flags we display in our church. It has 5 colour bars, representing five types of disabilities. It shows how disability is complex, but also how it can be united. That happens when we talk, understand and celebrate "the natural and beautiful parts of human diversity".



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### GIDEON'S HORN

How can blowing a horn win a battle? Gideon listens to God and leads an army to victory in a surprising way.

Make your own horn and fill it with treats this summer.

#### Ingredients

- waffle cones
- mini marshmallows
- semi-sweet chocolate chips
- If using a grill, preheat grill to mediumhigh heat, about 375 to 400 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Fill waffle cones with alternating layers of mini marshmallows and chocolate chips (plus any other mix-ins you'd like to add). Gently wrap each cone in foil.
- Place wrapped cones on grill grates, or at the edge of a hot campfire. Cook for 3 to 5 minutes, or until melted and gooey inside. Carefully remove from grill/campfire with tongs, allow to rest for 1 minute, then carefully unwrap and enjoy (contents will be hot!).

Change it up and substitute with graham cracker pieces, shredded coconut, peanut butter chips, or slices of banana. Use your imagination!
