Make Your Lent Green: This year we are using a green lens as we explore the readings for each Sunday in Lent. Why not make your whole Lent green? One way to do this is to follow the suggestions be A Rocha, a Christian environmental organization started in the UK. Here is a link to their UK website: https://arocha.org.uk/go-green-for-lent/

To Ponder: Each day of Lent the sun lifts higher in the horizon and gets noticeably stronger. This is why we call this season Lent, taken from Lencten, Old English for spring. This name is more astronomical than le Carême (French), based on the season's length, or Fastenzeit (German), from the practice of fasting. I like the connection to spring, even if it still feels so wintry here. It reminds me that this time of year is about growth, about spiritual renewal. I also like how it mirrors our experience of the sun as it brings rebirth after months of cold. It reminds me how connected everything is. Wind is generated by how our planet interacts with it, from breezes influenced by warming of the land to global winds generated by

the heat differential between parts of the globe. The sun is part of the water cycle that gives us rain and snow. Plants and animals rely on the sun to survive. The sun's heat and light are so important that we mimic them in our homes. We need all the elements working together for life to exist, and many of these are driven by the sun. No wonder the sun is a symbol of God's power and grace. This is one reason fire is used in so many religions. In Christianity, we light candles. As we seek to be the light of the world as Jesus tells us, perhaps in this we are to be like the sun, nurturing connections and helping life to grow.

- What impact does the sun have in your life, emotionally, physically, or spiritually?
- Have you considered how the sun is part of many interrelated processes on the planet? How might that knowledge affect your reading of Bible verses that refer to the sun?
- How might you be like the sun, or like fire, in your own life?

Spiritual Practise: Light a candle some time this week. Do so in a dark room if you can. Notice what happens to the dark as the flame is first lit. What would happen if we didn't have light and the heat that it generates. Pray with gratitude for these gifts of the sun, these gifts of God.

The Affirm Committees of Gower Street and St. James United Churches invite you to our education session on Gender Inclusive Curricula.

March 14TH, 5 PM TO 7 PM at St. James United Church

Over the past year, protests and counter-protests have erupted across Canada in response to new developments around gender inclusive curricula. In September, 2023 the "1 Million March 4 Children", saw people across the country take part in a protest they say aims to protect children from "premature sexualization and potential harmful indoctrination". Counter-protesters, including United Church leaders, challenged the movement stating that it promoted "misinformation, intolerance and hate toward the 2SLGBTQIA+ community". In St. John's No Space for Hate NL, a local pro 2SLGBTQIA+ group organized a counter-protest. Clergy from Gower and St. James joined with clergy from other United Churches and hundreds of other people in the wider St. John's area in support of inclusion, LGBTQ+ rights, and safe school spaces.

We know that there is misinformation, confusion, and concerns from many, both in our church communities and in the broader society about gender inclusive curricula. To address and reflect on some of these questions, the Affirming committees from Gower Street and St. James United are holding a joint education event on March 14th from 5-7 at St. James United Church. The objective of the event is to provide a safe and respectful space to address questions and concerns about the issue of gender inclusive curricula. The format of the event will include a panel of presenters with lived and professional experience of gender inclusive spaces, practices, and policies. The panel will be facilitated by Liz Ohle – founding member of Out in Faith NL.
